How do laws get passed?

- A Rep or Senator gets an idea for a new law or modification to an existing law
- Submits their idea to the LSB (Legislative Services Bureau), who
 actually writes the bill for them
- Bill gets introduced and submitted to a committee for review
- If committee likes it, they can vote to send it to a floor for a vote
- If it passes in one chamber, it must go to the other chamber
- Identical bill must pass both chambers to go to the Governor for signature
- Governor signs the bill into law



- How can I impact if a bill gets passed or the wording in a bill?
 - Write your rep
 - Can do this before the bill goes to the floor for a vote
 - Can also do this when it is in committee for discussion
 - Call your reps office
 - Can do this before the bill goes to the floor for a vote
 - Can also do this when it is in committee for discussion
 - Testify in a committee meeting
 - Submit written testimony to the committee chair before the committee hearing if you cannot attend in person

SENATE BILL NO. 76

The so-called expanded background check bill

- Changes 'pistol' registration to 'firearm' registration in 1927 PA 372
- Amended law would require:
 - A 'universal' background check on ALL firearm purchases AND Transfers
 - Registration of ALL firearms
- Introduced on 2/16/23 by Senator Kevin Hertel (D12)
- Passed the Senate on 3/15/23 along party line vote
- Goes to the House for consideration

Supporting Legislation

- SB77 expands 'pistols' to 'firearms' in penal code to include all long guns
- SB78 changes 'pistols' to 'firearms' in penal code describing felonies



SENATE BILL NO. 79 The so-called "Safe Storage" bill

Requires 'Safe Storage' of any firearm in a case where a minor could have access to a firearm mandating they be kept from children in a safe, or secured with a trigger lock

If a person is injured by unsecured firearm, the crime will be a felony

Supporting Legislation

• SB81 – The sale of firearm safety devices: safes, lock boxes, trigger and barrel locks, and other items designed to enhance home firearm safety. All are sold tax exempt.



SENATE BILL NO. 83 The so-called "Red Flag" bill

A bill to provide for the issuance of restraining orders prohibiting certain individuals from possessing or purchasing firearms and ordering the surrender and seizure of a restrained individual's firearms; to provide for the powers and duties of certain state and local governmental officers and entities; to prescribe penalties; and to provide remedies.

SENATE BILL NO. 83 The so-called "Red Flag" bill

What happens?

They seize your firearms and CPL, enter your name into data bases to keep you from obtaining more firearms. You get a hearing within 14 days to refute or validate order.

<u>Unconstitutional</u>

2nd Amendment – Keep and bear arms
14th Amendment – Right to due process
Bill of Rights – Article 6, unreasonable search and seizures
Miranda Rights – Innocent until proven guilty
